Terrestrial Globe, by John Senex, London, 1718 Inventory No. 28920

John Senex (c.1680?-1740) was one of a number of English instrument makers who established a reputation in the early 18th-century. As an engraver and seller of maps and globes, he became one of the leading cartographers of the 18th-century. His globes demonstrate a high level of knowledge of astronomy as well his skill as an engraver, cartographer and craftsman. According to Dekker and van der Krogt, John Senex (fl. 1690-1740) "stood at the beginning of a new branch of globe producers in Britain," in the early 18th-Century (Dekker & van der Krogt, p. 112). Senex began as an astronomer and map maker, and was also an engraver, publisher, surveyor and geographer to Queen Anne.

This terrestrial globe by John Senex was made in 1718. It is constructed around a plaster core, with brass fittings and stands 500mm in height. The lacquered paper gores are printed from engraved plates and coloured by hand. It is inscribed: "A New and Correct GLOBE of ye EARTH together with a View of ye General & Coasting Trade Winds, Monsoons, &c. Laid down according to ye Newest Descoveries and from ye most Exact Observations. By John Senex. Sold only by Him [illegible] Salisbury court near Fleet street. 1718".
